This occurred after he was thrown out by his mother when he "came out" to her at thirteen years of age.

The video/documentary about his story was shown on *Oprah* as well as at the Museum, and there is a new book that details his story and the coincidental meeting of his abuser, Tim Zaal, a neo-Nazi, who changed his violent views after he became a father. Many years later, both men become fellow docents at the Museum of Tolerance and to their surprise, met each other.

They both speak about the importance of forgiveness, and how hatred, when it is held close to the heart, "chains" the body and prevents that person from moving on.

I want to thank all of you who have taken time out of your busy schedule to support and participate in the many Holmes activities. I feel fortunate to work with such a positive and generous community of parents, students and staff

The primary mechanism by which DJUSD receives state funding for education is through the payment of ADA (average daily attendance) dollars. Our district gets about \$40 per student per day, as measured by our ADA. When a student is absent, whether excused or unexcused, our ADA goes down and our district loses money.

The district expects and plans for student absences due to illness or family emergencies. But absences due to family vacations take an unnecessary bite out of our district budget. If half the students in the district are absent one day due to vacation, then the district loses \$176,000 for the school year. That may not sound like much, but that would fund 1 full-time teacher. 1 counselor. 1 secretary and a half-time custodian. Keep this in mind if you are considering extending your vacation plans into school days this holiday season. And if

your vacation does take your student away from school, please think about donating lost revenues back to the school.

Remember to show everyone you meet an ounce of extra compassion this holiday season -you never know the stress others are under. Students Come Together

On November 12 and 13 forty-one SSA (Safe School Ambassadors) and five family leaders, including Mike Dufresne volunteering, participated in two days of training. The purpose was to teach Holmes student ambassadors 1) how to support each Holmes student in developing positive interactions with all students on campus, 2) how to defuse acts of bullying, exclusion, and vandalism to school property, and 3) how to foster positive communication between all school "groups."

Students took part in simulations of harassment, bullying, and exclusions; watched videos; and scripted dialogues on how they can interact with their peers in setting examples for Holmes students. After the training, students commented in their evaluations on how they "never felt they would have interacted with someone from that group, let alone become friends", and how they "would work to help Holmes become a safer place for all to be."

SSA family groups, comprised of 6-8 students and one family leader, meet bimonthly to discuss concerns and role play situations. Family groups help ambassadors deal more effectively with their peers and enable them to bond as leaders while demonstrating positive role modeling. Family leaders for 2009-2010 school year Deanna Leveque, Kerin Kelleher, Jennifer Sommer, Lisa Mowry, Joanna Littell, and Georgene Fritz want to thank the Holmes PTA for providing the funding to make this two-day training available to students. The ambassadors will continue to play a key role in making Holmes a safer place to be!

Dancing into the New Year

All grade levels will be dancing in the month of January in Physical Education. Our 7th graders will be learning folk dances from around the world, complementing the 7th grade social studies curriculum. Seventh graders will also learn the swing dance. We teach students the swing all three years, so by the time they exit for Davis High, they are top-level swing dancers. Our 8th grade students learn square dancing, complementing the 8th grade study of U.S. history. By the end of the unit, 8th graders can swing their partners as well as any square dancer in Davis. Our 9th graders learn social (couples) dancing from around the world, complimenting the 9th grade English curriculum which focuses on the classics of literature. Ninth graders also learn a special dance that they perform for the school at the end of the unit. This year's selection is "Jai Ho", the dance finale of the film "Slumdog Millionaire."

If you don't have a scrip card, get one! If you have one but it's lost in your wallet, find it and use it!

Participating in one or all of these institutions' generous programs does not cost you a dime, but cumulatively could generate some serious cash - IF YOU PARTICIPATE. So far this school year, these programs have added just over \$4,200 to your PTA's coffers – that's \$4,200 that will be used to support our kids and our school. But here's the rub: \$4,200 is only about 30 percent of the \$14,700 that our school assumes (hopes) will be there to support the library, for International Day, staff education and hospitality, drug and alcohol prevention, campus beautification and more. We're about one-third of the way through our school year, so we're running at or below our target. Signing up is easy:

Parent Community Book Project

The Parent Education Committee is organizing groups to read and discuss *The Price of Privilege* by Madeline Levine, PhD. This book is a thoughtfully written analysis of the plight of teens in the middle- and upper-middle class suburbs. Dr. Levine was a practicing youth psychologist who noticed that her patients seemed disconnected from their communities and felt "empty". Others teens were seriously depressed and self-destructive. She spoke to colleagues around the country and found that this phenomenon was widespread and that this community of children is at risk for serious psychological problems, developmental setbacks, and substance abuse issues. If you've ever wondered why "kids who have so much can feel empty" or "how affluence can get in the way of emotional development", this book will answer your questions in a sensitive and informative tone.

Counselors' Corner

Two Independent Options for 7th-Grade Health

The 7th grade Exploratory Cluster of elective courses includes a required quarter-long health course. Students who take both music and foreign language classes in 7th grade may waive taking the Health 7 class during the school year but are still required to complete it before entering 9th grade.

There are two independent options available to fulfill this requirement:

One option is a variety of assignments and activities in eight different topic areas, including communication, problem solving and refusal skills. When completed, the health course teacher will review the work and verify satisfactory completion. Details about this option are available in the counseling office.

Another option is to complete the on-line course "Health 31: Seventh and Eighth Grade Health Education" offered through Brigham Young University Independent Study (www.byu.edu). This is designed as a semester-long class and includes family life topics. There is tuition and materials fee for this course and the final must be proctored. Proof of successful course completion should be brought to the counseling office. Students choosing this option will still be required to participate in the two-week course on family life that is taught in 8th grade science classes.

Academic Talent Search Testing

In summer 2010, Sacramento State's Academic Talent Search (ATS) will offer 4th through 9th grade students the opportunity to take accelerated classes in a collegiate environment. The ATS qualifying exam will be given for students in grades 6-9 at Holmes on Tuesday, February 9th, at 3:30pm. Parents are taught skills on how to keep the door of communication open in their home and help guide their teen toward healthy sexual decisions.

Parents Who Host Lose the Most

At the end of October, the Secondary Schools Parent Education Group sent out a listserv announcement advising parents that some prime party days were just ahead—Articulation (minimum) Day and Homecoming. Our committee members heard of many parties on these days, and more on Halloween. Did you take any steps to secure your supply of alcohol? Did you hold your teen accountable for his/her location at all times? If not, you have another chance because the holidays are here! Our teens have lots of free, unsupervised time. And once again, many of them are ready to party! Again, we challenge you--what will you do to prevent the teens you know from partying over the holidays?

Insist on knowing where your teen is. Ask for a landline number if you don't know the home where your teen is going, and call it to make sure a parent is supervising the gathering of teens. Count your bottles of beer and mark the levels of open bottles of alcohol. Lock your prescription drugs. Even if your teen isn't using, you may be an unwitting supplier to other students who know you don't keep track of your drugs and alcohol. Open your home to teens that want to gather and supervise the party. And most importantly, make your expectations clear with your student: no drugs, no drinking.

Parent Tip (from HelpThemKnow.com): Make it easy for your child to leave a place where substances are being used. Discuss in advance how to contact you or another designated adult in order to get a ride home. If another adult provides the transportation, be up and available to talk about the incident when your child arrives home.

Discussion Topic with Your Teen: Brainstorm situations they might need to get out of and how they

would do so. Assure your student if they call for a ride, you will give it to them **no questions asked**. It might be awkward for them to explain the situation over the phone. Perhaps you might want to come up with a codeword with your teen—for them to use when they are in a bad situation and need to get out fast.

We challenge you -- what will you do to prevent the teens you know from partying over the holidays?
